Two Suspended Juny 13 anti-War activity

collowing closely upon the heels of the JING DAY demonstration, organized and led by the National Student League, two students, Meyer Rangell, vice-president-elect of the Student Council, and Meyer Schwartz, executive secretary of the CCNY chapter of the N.S.L., have been suppended pending a hearing on Wednesday, June 5th at 2 o'clock in Room 128, before the Faculty-Student Discipline Committee.

These students are being singled out for their participation in the anti-ROTO demonstration on May 29, in which hundreds of students took part. The reactionary administration is moving with all possible speed to suspend and expell as many militant students as possible before the beginning of next term. The purpose of this "strategy" is clear: to prevent effective mobilization of student opinion against such action

This attempt to railroad militant students out of school is part of a city wide drive to smash the student anti-war movement. In Hunter College, five girls have been indefinitely suspended for their activities in the Aprill2 Strike. It the Columbia Medical Center, two instructors and three technicians have been dismissed, and six studentsrefused admission for their anti-war activities. Similar repressive actions on the part of school administrations have taken place atvAbraham Lincoln and various other high schools.

n order to mobilize student sentiment to defeat the "strategy" of the administration, the hearing must be postponed to September, when we can get hundreds of students who participated in the demonstration to testify, and when the entire student body of dity College can sit in at an open hearing.
