STRIKE APR. 11. 8 P.M.

The danger of war is real. Any newspaper will tell you that. Germany rearms for war. British Ambassador Eden tours Europe to see where England's allies stand. France, Italy and England plan to meet in Stresa. Peace or war? The answer is not yet known.

The entire world will be intimately concerned if war breaks out. Powerful American interests with investments in foreign countries both large and small will press for American participation in the war of slaughter.

In 1898 Hearst's slogan "Remember the Maine" plus high-pressure war propaganda set America at Spain's throat--not to free Cuba from Spanish oppression but to saddle it--along with Porto Rico, Hawaii, and the Phillipines--with even more intense American domination. In 1918 it was "Make the World Safe for Democracy"--after U.S. Ambassador Page telegraphed President Wilson from Britain that the Allies were weakening, that American investments were threatened, that America would have to enter the war. These are facts substantiated in the press, in the histories, and in part by the recently squelched U.S. Senate Munitions Inquiry testimony.

Where is that democracy we saved in 1918? Where is it even in the CCNY Bronx center and James Monroe Evening High? The college students would like to know where their democratic, self-governing Student Council, guaranteed them in the official CCNY Bulletin. Maybe Dr. Hein, too, does not believe the world war was fought in the interests of democracy. Maybe Dr. Hein fears that our Student Council may at times differ with him. We must fight for that "democracy" we were told we would win in 1917.

We must oppose war now--in no indefinite, uncertain terms. The time to halt war is before war has broken out. Every student of James Monroe Evening H.S. and the CCNY Bronx center must actively participate in the nation-wide manifestations of student opposition to imperialist war. Every student must down books on April 11th at 8 p.m. (after the first period). We strike at this time instead of the 12th, as the students throughout the entire country will be doing, merely because we have no classes at 11 a.m. on the 12th. We will be among the first schools to strike. Together with other evening colleges and high schools in New York we will be among the starters of the mighty national action that will make those who look with approval toward the approaching war think again before continuing with their plans. America will see, on the eve of war, where we students stand.
