

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Note to the Secretary-General

The outcome of the International Conference on Financing for Development at Monterrey, 18-22 March 2002

- The FfD Conference was a success and the Monterrey Consensus proved to be a real achievement. Development and its financing are back on the agenda. There is a dramatic change with the past, with regard to a consensus on policies to mobilize domestic and international resources, the quantity and quality of aid, access of developing countries to markets of developed countries, participation of developing countries in economic-decision making and enhancing coherence of the monetary, financial and trading systems.
- Additional ODA commitments, amounting to at least \$30 billion by 2006 and at least \$12 billion per year afterwards (US \$5b + EU \$7b) gave a real boost to the FfD Conference and the Monterrey Consensus.
- The Conference forged a new global deal or partnership, where all partners have mutual responsibilities and commitments and face mutual accountability. In essence, a new policy base centred on the achievement of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) was agreed upon.
- Several government representatives moved beyond the Monterrey Consensus, for example, with regard to levels and type of ODA, innovative sources of finance, global governance and international tax cooperation.
- Many speakers pointed to the link with armed conflict and terrorism. Wars and terrorism cannot be fought with weapons alone. Poverty and inequalities can lead to despair and provide a breeding ground for violence, crime, corruption and terrorism. There is only one world with no walls. Poverty anywhere is poverty everywhere.
- The UN offers one of the few possibilities to have a direct interaction at the global level between Governments, international organizations and business and civil society representatives. Very frank exchanges, especially at the Roundtables, side events and at the NGO Forum, moved the discussions forward. Many speakers, for example, urged donors to enhance accountability of aid programmes, *inter alia*, through performance reviews.
- Several concrete proposals were suggested at the Conference, including by the business sector and by civil society. The proposals of the business sector, for example, are aimed at facilitating the flow of resources to developing countries through: 1) a global information clearing house; 2) the promotion of indigenous domestic capital formation, including microcredit and venture capital; 3) enhancing access to debt and equity finance capital; and 4) investment guides for Least Developed Countries, which is being jointly developed with UNCTAD.
- This was the first UN conference on financial issues. The active collaboration, participation and support of IMF, World Bank and WTO were remarkable.
- The Conference expressed strong support for strengthening the UN.
- The UN (GA and ECOSOC) will be at the centre of the follow up with annual reviews that will include the institutional stakeholders (IMF, World Bank and WTO) as well as the business sector and civil society representatives.

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- The real challenge will be implementation on the ground: sustained financing having a real impact. Johannesburg will be an important step in this direction.
- The Retreat for Heads of State and Government did not produce a declaration, as some were hoping. Yet, President Fox in his press conference mentioned support for further exploration of ways to finance Global Public Goods, going beyond the Monterrey Consensus. Surprisingly, he did not mention the Johannesburg Summit.
- DESA Secretariat, Conference Services and DPI should be commended for an excellent job in difficult conditions. International press coverage was extraordinary. Participation of senior staff from Funds and Programmes was solid.
